#### What is it?

- An initiative by the UX Research Team who will be running a cycle of discovery interviews with users.
- A space for exploring topics that are usually out of scope.

#### Why are we doing it?

- Adds to our knowledge base and increases empathy with our users.
- Opens opportunities for non-researchers to practise user research methods.
- Allows researchers to experiment with new processes and methods.

# Insights

### What do our teachers think of Moodle?

"It's wonderful, sweetie! Everything about Moodle is wonderful."

"It allows us to deliver quality education for people who wouldn't be able to come to a face-to-face class."

-Participant 3, Papua New Guinea

" It's very intuitive. I learned it by myself and I use a lot of tools that Moodle has, and it was easy to learn."

### **Teacher Motivations**

Why do they teach? 3/6 teachers expressed a genuine love and passion for teaching, whereas the other teachers took opportunities offered to them.

What challenges do they face as a teacher? Unmotivated students and faculty who are not always open to learning new things or adapt to modern technologies. Contributing factors to this mindset include age, an unwillingness to let go of cultural traditions and/or lack of tech skills.

"Teaching has always been a pleasure. Everyday I think to myself 'How can I do better'?"

"To go to university and become a teacher was a status thing."

"It's hard for me to explain to someone who doesn't want to learn."

"Academics don't like being told what to do."

### **Student Motivations**

Poverty is a common theme shared amongst these countries. Students are motivated to better their lives and increase their opportunities but many lack access to technology tools and internet connectivity. As a result, they can have lower levels of digital literacy.

Teachers have to be mindful of including course content that is relevant, relatable and understandable to all their students.

"I have to make sure that I'm not using data intensive images."

"The people these days are looking for opportunities to improve their quality of life."

"We have so many challenges with transport and remote locations and accessibility to quality education."

### **Engaging Students**





Teachers like including media and visuals in course content to increase student engagement.

This is challenging with data and storage limitations, and poor and unreliable internet connection.

"The internet connection and the velocity of the page is the problem. Many videos don't work."

"There are alot of students accessing it (internet) and that's why it becomes slow."

-Participant 6, Philippines

" I was very concerned about images because they take a very long time to download."

-Participant 1, South Africa

### **Student Communication**

Students are more expressive and vocal in person. Some come from cultures that favour oral communication so reading and writing is more of a challenge.

This doesn't translate well online in virtual lessons or Moodle forums.

"When I require them to open their cameras, they're not really comfortable because they're wearing house clothes."

"Reading and writing are not part of our culture. We handed down knowledge through spoken language."

"It is an oral culture. In whatsapp they use a lot of audio messages."

"In person or 1:1 they always have something to say."

### **Conclusion**

- Teachers in developing countries have similar motivations and challenges to teachers elsewhere:
  - Passion for teaching despite low salaries.
  - Doing their best to engage and support students.
- Issues they face exist in other countries but may be more pronounced for these teachers:
  - Poverty, access to tech, low digital literacy.
  - Internet connectivity.
  - Communication preferences based on culture and language.
- Improving accessibility is not just about physical and cognitive differences. Considering cultural and social needs will benefit everyone.
